Dear Parents & Carers,

Secondary School Applications:

A reminder regarding applications for admission into Secondary School – September 2025

The closing date for applications into Year 7 is 31st October 2024. You must also complete an application form from the borough in which you reside.

Reception Applications:

If you have a child born between 1 September 2020 and 31 August 2021, your child will be eligible to apply for a Reception place in September. Please remember that transfer from Nursery to Reception is not automatic - a new application needs to be made via the council online platform, and a Supplementary Information Form (SIF) needs to be submitted to the school. Supplementary Information Forms are available on the school website or at the school office. Please see the Reception Admissions Policy on the school website for details of documents to be submitted with the SIF. The deadline for applications is 15th January 2025.

Nursery Applications:

We also have spaces in our nursery, so if your child is three years of age before 31st December (or you know of anyone with a three-year-old not in nursery), please visit our website for an application form.

Extended Schools Booking -Spring Term 2025

Please see the attached newsletter from the Extended Schools team.

Bookings for Spring Term Childcare open on Sunday 17th November at 8pm, with clubs opening on Wednesday 20th November at 8pm.

I know Extended Schools has been an item on the Parent/ Caregiver Forum agenda, particularly around the booking system and the number of places available. Parents have reported difficulties accessing the system and subsequently find it



difficult to make bookings. We have checked the system again, and can't find any glitches. We have attached an updated guide on how to book and have double checked that this actually works. Hopefully, this time round booking will be easier for you.

Regarding capacity, we have ninety places available each night, which is an increase of ten spaces compared to last year. The number of places available is determined by the space which is available for the running of the provision. We must also ensure that the set staff / pupil ratios are adhered to. Most nights there are two clubs running alongside childcare and within this, we have to ensure that the large hall is available to be used if there is wet weather – which at the moment is nearly every night. On wet weather nights, the small hall may have up to sixty pupils, which is no easy task to manage.

We are extremely lucky that our wonderful class teaching assistants also work as part of the Extended Schools team, which means that your children are being looked after by staff who know them well. I can report that pupil behaviour in this provision is exemplary and staff provide a calm, nurturing environment for the pupils to be in.

The main purpose of this provision is to provide childcare first for parents who are working and require this. That is why childcare bookings go live first, followed by clubs a few days later.

If you are not successful in securing a booking, we do have a waiting list which is systematically followed and parents are contacted when places arise. I completely understand that it is frustrating and disappointing when you are unable to secure a booking but I would kindly ask that any communication with the extended staff team (in person, via phone or email) is done in a courteous and respectful manner. We must remember that as adults we lead by example to our children.

Reading books have been updated for both class libraries and phonics – benefitting all year groups

Fund an on-site art therapist once a week to conduct art therapy with children needing support


